

COUNCIL CATCH-UP

Welcome to my second community catch up for 2018. A busy time of the year for all of us, getting ready for the Christmas and New Year period. I would like to take this opportunity to wish everyone a safe and happy festive season, it will be here before you know it. Take time to share some time and a laugh with your family and friends during this period if you are able, while it can be a stressful period for many.

I would like to use this edition to talk more on the matter of Lake Wyangan as it has been aired recently in the news, radio and social media and I believe that while solutions will take time to come to fruition the steps that are being proposed will work to assist in a positive outcome. I am very supportive of current proposals to seek funds to address the problems at the Lake and believe that with more available funds Council should be able to achieve better outcomes to the problem of water quality. I envisage the Lake precinct to become a real jewel of a public resource for the community but I urge patience. It is not a simple fix and financially

we need to be realistic. Users of the Lake will understand that since water reforms have occurred the flows into the Lake have reduced dramatically all in accordance with better farming practices and working with a scarcer resource. Using water better is something that has had to occur and a consequence of less steady overflows into the Lake and changes in farming practices around the Lake catchment it has led to regular outbreaks of Blue Green Algae which has been undesirable to all users and the community. Council has been aware of this for a long time and commissioned a report with assistance from Murrumbidgee Irrigation into the problem with the aim of coming up with a long-term solution. To maintain the Lake, Council allocates a portion of its town water supply resource pool. This is allocation that the City owns and provides to residents for consumptive purposes, it is a very secure resource. The amount of water allocation to the Lake may vary annually depending on evaporation and use, for example if the local boat club was

holding a significant event liaison between it and Council would occur for water top ups. This season, discussions are being held about the possibility of trading this allocation instead of placing it in the lake for capital gain (which Council is permitted to do) to be able to commence works at the Lake to have a positive impact on the condition of it, a start for its future. This matter has yet to go before Council formally however the word is out there and discussions held with members of user groups at the Lake have been quite positive to date and acknowledgment that this is a start to fixing this problem is promising. I trust that the community supports some positive action on this front. It is also important to note that recently a project officer Tom Ryan was appointed to manage and oversee works at the Lake precinct with regard to the Lake Wyangan Catchment Management Strategy Project which Council is using as a road map to create a solution for Lake Wyangan. This shows just how serious Council is taking the matter of correcting the Lake. The strategy project

identified more than 20 options for the Lake and a range of options will be investigated, including in Lake and catchment options. Each solution must address the three causes of algae, sediment (nutrient loading), circulation (residence time of the water) and sunlight (temperature). Understanding the issue was the first step toward this and the project delivered on that. Council now moves on to monitoring the conditions, it needs to understand the system of the Lake better to allow a thorough management strategy to be developed and resourced. In my discussions with members of the community I understand the frustration at the pace but Council needs to ensure the fix that it does will work, be reliable and beneficial to the Lake precinct and the community.
