

## Recycle problem waste for free

Griffith City Council is reminding residents that the Tharbogang Landfill now has a Community Recycling Centre (CRC) available for problem waste.

Council's Waste Operations Manager, John Roser said the CRC was opened last year, forming part of the EPA's Community Recycling initiative.

"Community Recycling Centres are drop off centres for common household problem wastes that can't be collected via the council kerbside system," said Mr Roser.

"Problem wastes are materials like paint, gas bottles, batteries and oils, items which are typically difficult to dispose of. At Council's CRC you can drop your problem wastes off for free."

Items which can be disposed at the CRC include paint, gas bottles, fire extinguishers, motor oils and other oils, car and household batteries, smoke detectors, and fluoro globes and tubes.

"Only household quanti-

ties of these materials will be accepted. As a guide, this is a maximum container of 20 litres or 20 kilograms for each waste type," said Mr Roser.

"In using the CRC, you are helping to not only dispose of problematic waste safely, but helping to recycle these items."

"For example, paints are mixed with other waste solvents and used as an alternative to fuel in cement kilns. The metal containers are recycled. Lead acid batteries are sent to recyclers where the lead, acid and plastic are recovered and recycled, while gas cylinders have remaining gas recovered, and steel sent for recycling. Many cylinders are retested and recycled into the hire market," he added.

Council's CRC is located at the Tharbogang Waste Management Facility and can be accessed 7 days per week, 8am - 5pm.

The CRC is for household use only, businesses are not eligible to access this service.

Community profile allows you to access Census data including population age, ethnicity, education, disability, employment, unpaid work, income, household type, structure and more. See point-in-time data going back six Census periods (1991 to 2016), or see how our population has changed using the change-over-time tables.

Social atlas complements the community profile, the social atlas presents population data in an interactive map. Visualise the distribution of our population based on diversity, income, education, housing, age and many other 'maps' relevant to the Griffith region.

Economic profile has both

top-line economic indicators for Griffith (gross regional product, employment, industry and market data and more), and tools to analyse and evaluate opportunities in the local economy, including the impact of investment and events.

Population forecast combines an analysis of local and regional demographic trends with data for known or planned residential development to deliver population and dwelling forecasts out to 2037.

Economic Development Officer, Leanne Austin said we are excited to be promoting these resources and to offer them to the whole community.

"Being able to access accurate statistical data is very useful in making evidence-based decisions and generating support for these decisions," she said.


