



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Griffith Festival of Gardens

We extend to you a warm invitation to come to Griffith - the garden city of the Riverina - to come and enjoy the colourful Festival of Gardens.

Spring is a special time in the country. Nowhere is this more so than in Griffith. The warm sunshine, fertile soils and abundant mountain fresh waters of the irrigation



scheme, combine to provide the ideal conditions for nature's spring awakening.

Everywhere in Griffith - from the parks through to the gardens, there are brilliant colours on display as flowers, shrubs and trees awaken from their winter hibernation.

To celebrate this spring awakening, the popular Griffith Festival of Gardens allows you to see and enjoy the very best of Mother Nature's beauty.

For your viewing pleasure, 14 private gardens - ranging from town plots, larger acreage displays, farm gardens and through to delightful country gardens - are open for you to see and enjoy.

Each garden has something different to offer - no two are the same. Each gardener has sown his or her individual personality

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into their garden, and this results in a diverse range of colourful offerings.

At the same time, in nearby Cocoparra National Park, a mantle of wildflowers generally follows the gentle spring rains. When this occurs, the park adds another colourful dimension to the Festival.

But Griffith is also much more than the Festival of Gardens.

Take the time to enjoy the many other aspects that makes a visit to Griffith special.

See historic Pioneer Park, which serves as a reminder of Griffith's early settlers as they carved a city from the barren wilderness. Or visit the arts and craft shops where many local items are on display and available for sale.

Then there is the Regional Art Gallery or the Regional Theatre with its majestic, soft sculptured artistic curtain. Each has much to offer the visitor.

No visit to Griffith would be complete without taking the opportunity to sample the quality wines of the city. Wines which have earned a reputation for quality and which have won many prizes at exhibitions both domestically and internationally. When at the wineries, keep an eye out for the cellar masters specials, there's often some excellent bargains to be found.



The Festival Gardens

The Festival Gardens are open from 9.30am through to 5.00pm. Entry prices are \$2.00 for entry to a single garden and \$15.00 for entry to all the gardens. Morning and afternoon teas \$3.00, Lunch \$5.00.

Julie Armstrong: "Corrynnia Station", Carrathool
 This large garden is a mix of cottage and formal highlighted by the use of terracotta statuary. Style and simplicity are key elements with cool colours favoured. Featuring roses, daisies, lavender, Queen Anne's lace, nigella and bougainvillea.

Charity:- Goolgowi School. Lunch, Morning and Afternoon tea available.

Liz Bunn: "Jeanella", Goolgowi
 Set on one hectare, sweeping lawns lead you through garden beds full of colour. An archway beckons as annuals flower alongside the orchard. Extensive areas of native plantings about the main garden.

Charity:- Combined Churches of Goolgowi. Lunch, Morning and Afternoon tea available.

Nora Ceccato: Farm 2380 Clark Road, Yoogali
 Nora's dream was a garden where she could work with plants and nature and watch the results with satisfaction. The garden started as an encroachment into the family citrus farm and is now extensive, having evolved over a period of 45 years.

Charity:- Arthritis Association & Griffith Leisure Gardens Trust Fund.

Mr & Mrs Colla: 9 Lawford Cres., Griffith
 This garden has won nine prizes in Griffith garden competitions. The initial design by local artist Kevin Sheridan included the use of local rock. The Colla's have now extended the basic design planting many seedlings & shrubs.

Audrey Davies: Farm 2043 Boorga Rd, Nericon
 In farming tradition, the garden was the only area not suitable for agriculture. Finally, many trees became established. Today there is 1 1/2 acres of shady trees, shrubs, lawns and flowers.

David & Esther Dumbleton: Macedone & McCormack Rd, Griffith

A 1/2 hectare garden featuring deciduous trees in a spacious lawn setting. Special features include a 1903 windmill. The homestead "Heather Brae" blends in harmoniously with the gardens.

 Lunch, Morning and Afternoon tea available.

Pat Jones: "Yambiana" Yenda
 Lawns wind around curving gardens, harbouring stands of tall timber to give shelter and provide magnificent vistas. Background plantings provide rich foliage and flower colour, whilst the house verandas are framed with climbing roses.

Charity:- Griffith Genealogical & Historical Society (with historical display & trading table).
 Lunch, Morning and Afternoon tea available.

Helen McDermott: "Ripple Vale" Goolgowi
 Prior the arrival of domestic water in 1977, only the most hardy plants could be grown. Small beds were established and lawn sown. There are now many focal points, featuring colourful foliage, natives, old fashioned roses, a creek and ponds.

Charity:- Combined Churches of Goolgowi.
 Fashion parade - Sunday afternoon.

Nat & Allan Murray: Portion 959 Kendall Lane
 Natives are interspersed with exotic shrubs and bushes. Sweeping lawns give a feeling of space while dwarfed citrus trees allow views of our city. Ground covers have been used extensively, whilst hydrangeas and roses add colour.

Charity:- Griffith Riding for the Disabled.
 Morning and Afternoon tea available.

Peter & Belle Morris: Maegraith Place, Somerton Park
 A unique garden, nestled under a canopy of natives. A garden full of ferns, orchids and other sub tropical plants. The garden gives the impression it goes on and on forever.

Charity:- Presbyterian Church.

Joy & Bruno Plos: 5 Maegraith Place, Somerton Park
 A natural bushland setting. With an abundance of trees, shrubs, perennial and exotic plants. Roses are prominent with the sunken garden featuring lovely heritage roses.

Charity:- Griffith Lions Club (Display of wedding photographs taken in garden).
 Lunch, Morning and Afternoon tea available.

Roy & Lorraine Pratt: 21 Park Street, Yenda
 Told he could not grow maidenhair ferns in the Griffith climate, Roy decided to try. Before long some varieties were flourishing and the "Maidenhair Factory" was begun. There are now 2,000 ferns on display.

Andrew & Belinda Storie: 26 Carrathool Street
 The garden development has been towards a cottage feel, to compliment the style of the house. Attention has been paid to creating satisfying and harmonious colour and leaf texture combinations. Perennials abound to a backdrop of shrubs and roses.

Jim & Vera Vardanega: 10 Beale Street
 A small yard does not necessarily mean a small garden. Imaginative use of florals, trees, potted plantings and espaliered shrubs are a feature - a must for anyone living in a unit or with a small area they wish to transform into a colourful oasis.
